The following is a list of activities you may like to do during your summer holidays, in preparation for studying BTEC Level 3 Subsidiary Diploma in Music (Performing).

Your GCSE or BTEC course at school will have provided you with some valuable experience of performing, researching, analysing and listening. It may also have provided you with experiences of working in groups with other musicians.

On this course these skills will be dramatically developed, so it is as well that you keep your musical wits sharp!

On the BTEC Music Performing course you will be required to perform music from a variety of different genres. You will find it helpful if you are already aware of some of the leading musicians of each genre and how the music of each genre is constructed.
