

Our students regularly do twice as well on their A Level (or equivalent) courses, than they are predicted to, using a comparison of nationally predicted grades, and average GCSE scores.

Results Roundup

In-line with previous years and despite the difficult backdrop of Covid, Reigate College students once again achieved some excellent results, with all but a handful of students securing places at their first-choice universities.

For A Level, 67.4% of students received high grades (A* to B), with a 99% pass rate.

For BTEC, 68% of students received high grades (Distinction*/Distinction) – a figure that is well above the national average. This is encouraging, since students are now required to sit externally assessed exams, bringing the BTEC courses even further in-line with A Levels.

Nick Clark, Principal of Reigate College commented, "I'm so proud of what our

students achieved this summer. These are outstanding results, following a similar trajectory to previous cohorts, despite incredibly challenging circumstances."

"I would like to thank all our Upper Sixth leavers, together with their teachers and support staff for digging into their reserves of both resilience and determination to achieve the best possible outcomes."

All the College's Oxbridge and MVD offer-holders secured their places, with 10 students gaining places at either Oxford or Cambridge and 10 securing places to read Medicine or Veterinary Science.



Building for a Brighter Future

Director of Estates and IT, Garry Holmes talks to On Route about one of the biggest and most complicated building projects he's overseen, in his 35-year career at the College.

On Route: What does this latest building project involve and what are the anticipated timescales?

Garry Holmes: Studying, eating and socialising are always top of the importance list, for our students (not necessarily in that order!) and this project will result in dramatic improvements in all three areas. By early 2023, the project will be fully completed, and will result in:

 A state-of-the-art, two storey Independent Learning Centre (ILC) that will be dedicated to silent, independent study, operating much like a library, but with the emphasis on access to digital resources. This will double the capacity of the current ILC.

A welcoming, spacious, two-storey Refectory that will include a small servery on the first floor, as well as improved facilities on the ground floor, providing a fantastic space for students to socialise with their friends.

OR: How easy is it, keeping the College's facilities open and functioning normally during the build?

GH: Logistically it's a big challenge, as the College will be open for 'business as usual' during the project, so we've had to break the project into three discreet phases:

- Phase 1 is the extension of the current New Refectory (East Wing), to create a new ground floor entrance foyer, WCs and a lift, plus extra seating at the rear, together with the addition of a whole new first floor. By Easter 2022 we will be ready to open this building, with the first floor being used as an Independent Learning Centre, and the ground floor as temporary Refectory space.
- Phase 2 will start after Easter 2022 and will involve extending the old Refectory (West Wing) upwards, to create a second floor. Once complete, around December 2022, this building will become a two storey Refectory, with a small servery area on the first floor, and will vastly increase the current capacity.
- Finally, Phase 3 will start in January2023 and will see the full completion

of both the new Independent Learning Centre and the new Refectory. At this point, the temporary huts and marquees will be taken down and removed from the site.

OR: What's the estimated cost of the project and how is it being paid for?

GH: It will be in the region of £3.5 million.

We made a bid for funding to the BCIF (Building Condition Improvement Fund) via the Department of Education and were successful in obtaining funding of just over £2 million. The rest is being funded through College reserves.

OR: What will be the benefit of the project be to students and staff?

GH: Put simply, massive amounts of extra space! The new ILC will be capable of accommodating over 300 students, for independent, silent study, while the Refectory improvements will result in less queues and more seating, making it a better social space.

OR: How does this project compare with previous ones in terms of workload and difficulties?

GH: Of all the projects I've been involved with at the College, this has been the most complicated.

A perfect storm of Covid, Brexit then the Suez Canal crisis have all played a part in further complicating matters. Building contractors have found it extremely difficult to put a price on the project because of the ever-increasing cost of building materials. Being able to obtain certain materials has been problematic in

some areas too, since a lot of materials are supplied from overseas. Despite this, it is all on course to be completed on time.

OR: Which other main building projects have you overseen at College?

GH: Since 1998, I have overseen the construction of:

- The Priory Building 1998/9
- The Pavilion at our Wallfield playing fields - 2000



- The Visual Arts Centre 2001
- Business Centre 2002/3
- Dramatic Arts Centre 2004/5
- The original 'New Refectory' 2006/7
- Garden Building 2007/8
- The East and West Wings 2010
- The Sports Centre 2011
- The Enhancement Centre 2012/13
- Priory Building extension 2015
- Addition of second floor to Dramatic Arts - 2017

OR: Who's in the current project team and how well does the team work together?

GH: The project team consists of myself, the College Finance Director and College Senior Leadership Team.

It's a really focused group. We've worked extremely well together, over a number of years. It helps that we're all united in the belief that having first-rate accommodation, that we can all be extremely proud of, is a key ingredient to our success as a College.

A typical project takes around a year before any building work starts on site, so it's a much longer process than most people realise.





Pathways to Success

Following the enormous success of the Medicine, Vets and Dentists (MVD) Pathway, which this year resulted in 9 Upper Sixth students securing places at either Medical or Dentistry Schools, two additional pathways have been added to the Aspire and Tutorial Programmes -'Women in STEM' and 'Careers in Health':

Women in STEM Pathway

The College's Women in STEM pathway is the mastermind of three members of staff: Associate Director of Progression Ellen Walkinshaw, Head of Chemistry Louise Harris and Deputy Head of Maths Simon King.

Simon King, spoke to On Route about the new pathway and why it's become such a focus for the College.

On Route: Where did the idea for a dedicated Women in STEM pathway come from?

Simon King: My colleagues and I, who teach in STEM fields (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) recognise there's a huge gender divide, in these subject areas, with vastly more boys opting to take STEM subjects (particularly Further Maths,

Physics and Computer Science) at A Level or university, than girls.

My trigger for taking action was my attendance at a seminar last June, on the topic of Women in STEM. It was through that, that I recognised we could and should do more at Reigate College to help make a positive change.

With the input and support of various STEM colleagues at the College, we agreed that creating a 'Women in STEM Pathway' allows us to provide a vital support network for the young women at College doing STEM subjects, that they could use to explore STEM careers, and gain vital input from inspiring women working in STEM fields.

OR: How and at what stage can students join the pathway?

SK: It's a very open and flexible group. Any student identifying as female, who is studying a STEM subject, can register their interest and then get involved in as many of the opportunities we have planned, as they want to. They just need to express their interest by emailing aspire@reigate. ac.uk

ON: What sorts of things will you be offering?

SK: The plan is to meet as an additional tutorial group, at regular intervals, to explore specific topics including university courses, as well as apprenticeship and sponsored degree opportunities. We're also lining up external speaker events and Reigate College Alumni, for students to interview. Plus, we're also hoping to offer some trips.

OR: What are you hoping students will gain, by being part of this new pathway?

SK: The hope is that the young women attending the sessions and activities will feel more confident talking about STEM and be motivated to follow career options in STEM fields.

Although in its infancy, we're also hoping that the young women who engage with this group, will go on to offer their support to future Reigate College students.

Women in STEM Applicants' Event

As an additional push to encourage more girls to consider taking STEM subjects at A Level, and pursue careers in STEM fields, on 17 November the College ran its first Women in STEM, Year 11 Applicants' Event.

Aimed at female students who may be considering studying Physics, Maths, Further Maths, Engineering or Computer Science at the College, the event included talks by College staff and two external speakers, in addition to a Q&A with a panel of current female STEM students.


Following on the back of the success of previous Summer Schools, the College will be running two Summer Schools this summer:
