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Out and About

Brighton Creativity Day

During November and December, groups of Upper Sixth students on the BTEC Creative Digital Media Production course went on a 'Creativity Day' to Brighton, as part of the course's Sound Design Unit. Armed with a brief to create a radio documentary or Spotify advert to promote the culture of Brighton, students visited the amazing film studios of the BIMM Institute and took part in a Foley Design Workshop (creating sound effects and ambient noise in postproduction).







Their practical tasks on Brighton Pier involved creating vox pops of people talking about visiting and living in Brighton and a sound scavenger hunt for collecting sounds to add to the Reigate Media Sound Library - from the sound of footsteps on pebbles on the beach, to seagulls squawking, crowds jostling and waves crashing.

The day was an exciting opportunity to learn more about the world of sound design, while getting to grips with using sound equipment for real.

Lower Sixth students doing BTEC Sport headed to Wimbledon's All England Lawn Tennis & Croquet Club (AELTC) in October. The trip included a tour of the grounds, an educational talk about the business of Wimbledon and a visit to the Wimbledon Lawn Tennis Museum.

As well as providing students with the opportunity to visit an unique world-famous sporting venue, the trip also gave them the chance to find out about some of the job opportunities available there.

Upper Sixth Travel & Tourism students visited London's Olympic Park as part of the 'Events, Conferences and Exhibitions' unit of their course. Their day involved a guided tour of the site of the 2012 London Olympic and Paralympic Games, with a focus on finding out how sustainability and the environment are still very much a driving force, with respect to on-going developments.





The Lower Sixth's visit to Madame Tussauds was geared to seeing first-hand how technology is transforming the visitor experience. As well as exploring three floors of lifelike, hand-built celebrity figures, they were also able to experience the Marvel Universe 4D Cinema with its wind-chilling, water-soaking and face-flinching special effects!

Our thanks to the College's Trip Coordinators Theresa Jarvis and Louisa Farrant for organising the College's amazing annual programme of around 85 day trips and 6 residentials – from visits to the British Film Institute, West End theatre trips and The Royal Observatory to International trips to Iceland (Geography), Berlin and Paris (History) and New York (Visual Arts and Film and Media).

Results Roundup 2023

As was widely reported in the summer, Ofqual, England's exams regulator, brought the 2023 A Level results back to pre-pandemic levels in England after a spike in 2020 and 2021 when grades were based on teachers' predictions. Despite this, the College once again bucked the trend and achieved results well above the national grade profiles for 2023 and 2019 (post and pre-Covid).

The combination of our students' hard work, dedication and commitment and the targeted support and development the College offers, resulted in most of our 2023 leavers gaining places at their first-choice universities. For this cohort, last summer's exams were the first public exams they had sat, which added a further level of challenge.

Ellen Walkinshaw, Director of Progression at the College shared the exciting news that:

- More than 100 students achieved at least 3 A or A* grades at
- 18 students had offers confirmed to study Medicine, Veterinary Science or Dentistry

She added. "It was encouraging to see that the College's specialist 'Career Pathways' tutorial programme is having an impact on the range of progression routes students are taking, including apprenticeships."

This takes the form of a weekly Aspire tutorial, that's offered in addition to regular weekly tutorials, to help them with researching post-College options at the UK's most competitive universities and on the most prestigious courses.

How can the Aspire Programme help students?

The Aspire tutorials in the Lower Sixth are geared up to help students:

- Identify the things they're passionate about hobbies and interests and things they love doing.
- Research different career possibilities using Careers quizzes and a variety of Careers tools the College subscribes to.
- Explore the huge range of course options accessible via the UCAS (universities) website.
- Spend time looking into which universities offer the courses they're most interested in.
- Pin down the best combination of courses and universities to apply for, based around their predicted grades, and other personal criteria (such as distance from home).
- Begin writing their personal statements for their UCAS application.
- Develop their academic, "super-curricular" interests often via an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)

Career Pathways

At the beginning of the Upper Sixth all Upper Sixth students join either a Generic or Specialist Career Pathway - see table right.

Students considering applying for Oxbridge, MVD or other 'Careers in Health,' join these specialist pathways at the beginning of their Lower Sixth, so that they are fully prepared to make stand-out applications as early as possible in their Upper Sixth.

Careers in Health

Belinda Jones, Head of Health & Social Care and a Careers in Health Tutor explains, "Having a tutorial period each week, from the beginning of the Lower Sixth, dedicated to students considering working in the broad area of healthcare (from Nursing, to Physiotherapy and Radiography) means they receive specialist, targeted support, which in turn helps them achieve their goals."

Student Susanna Hickman said, "The Careers in Health Pathway has helped me develop my interview skills. I've been able to practice example questions with the people around me who have similar interests to me."

"I'm hoping to do a Nursing Apprenticeship at East Surrey Hospital which will take four years. I'm keen on doing an Apprenticeship because I can start applying my knowledge immediately and this route will give me more experience on the wards with patients."

Extended Project Qualification

Students on the College's Aspire Programme are invited to do an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), as an additional qualification from the beginning of their Lower Sixth.

The EPQ gives students the opportunity to explore an area of specific interest to them (as an extended essay, artefact or field study), that's maybe only loosely connected to their A Level (or equivalent) courses. The only requirement is that they select an area they are passionate about, as the qualification requires working independently, in much the same way as is expected at university.

216 students were entered for an EPQ in the academic year 2022-3 and through it, were able to deepen their knowledge of an area of personal interest and develop vital independent research skills.

For 2023 leavers, 95.8% achieved an A*- B for their EPQ, and by doing so, many received more favourable university offers.



Josh took a year out to decide the best route



Josh Alder, 2021 leaver, Level 6 (Digital & Technology Solutions), Vodafone

Because of my GCSE results, I only just qualified for the College's Level 3 programme - I knew this was a chance to sort myself out and take control of my future. I wanted to apply to uni and apprenticeships with my real results and took a year out after College to work. While I got a good uni offer, in my heart I knew that apprenticeships were right for me. I applied for many roles before hitting on success, and each time I learnt from the experience to improve my next application or interview. Persistence pays off: the more you put in, the more you get out!

Tilly deferred uni and found an apprenticeship

I was always one to put my head down and get on with the work, without asking questions. I'm now a serial questioner, with far more knowledge, understanding, and confidence than before. Don't be afraid to ask questions about career choices and their feasibility; do ask that question in a lesson; and be open to asking for others' opinions – it's all part of learning and development.

Jack stayed adaptable and followed his interests

I knew uni wasn't for me. When the pandemic impacted my plans to be a fighter pilot, I explored another passion – fast cars - and targeted my search accordingly. Unusually, I applied for and was offered the first apprenticeship that I saw that felt like a great fit. People sometimes ask me if I've missed out on uni life, but I don't feel I have: I moved away from home to do my apprenticeship, I've made friends with my work colleagues and I'm not too far away from friends at uni in Nottingham when I fancy a bit of social.

Charlotte's favourite topic helped her search

Market research was a tiny part of Business A Level but I loved it, and that's where I focused my search. I applied for some big-name companies, and they had extensive recruitment processes. Although it's daunting, remember they aren't expecting a massive CV when you're only 18, but do spend time on a well-written and researched covering letter. Joining LinkedIn at College was a great way to keep my CV up-to-date and follow companies I was interested in working for, to find opportunities.

I had university applications in but, after talking to friends, I considered apprenticeships. Being on the ball early in the Upper Sixth for some of the larger companies is important if you want to line up a job for when you leave - JP Morgan's recruitment window opens in September and closes in December. Do write decent CV over the summer to save time, and contact the Careers team for interview tips. Make sure you can keep on track and organise your time for what can be a long recruitment process: it's a skill in itself to juggle recruitment while keeping up with College work and mocks!

Jamie negotiated how best to balance work and study

For me, the biggest adjustment when I started was balancing the need to study with working. After discussing this with my Manager, we agreed that rather than trying to attempt a bit each day, I should study one full day a week at home - or in a quiet space away from my desk - to better manage my time between work and studying. This made the experience a lot easier and enabled me to keep on track with my studies and my responsibilities at work.

Making Work Experience Count



Work experience has focused George's career goals

Upper Sixth student George Evered, who was previously at Reigate School, is studying A Levels in Graphics and Photography and a BTEC Level 3 in Creative Digital Media Production.

On Route caught up with him to find out about his recent work experience and how it's helped him set his sights on working in the Film Industry.

OR: How did you kick start your work experience?

GE: The first project came about through Film Teacher Yvonne McCoach, who was looking for students to be part of a production team for a short film she was working on with former BBC presenter Nicholas Owen. The film was first shown during the Reigate Tunnel Bicentenary Celebrations in the summer.

OR: That sounds great. Was it hard finding more?

GE: With the help of the College, I was put in touch with former student Guy Taylor,

who runs his own production company Gatton Films. This led to four days at the London Film Studios in Enfield working as a Production Assistant on a short film. During my time there I got a brilliant insight into how a film studio works... and got involved with rigging, running and catering. I made some great industry connections.

OR: How else has your work experience helped you?

GE: Through the College's Film and Media Department, I heard about the short film courses run by the British Film Institute. I applied for three and got offers on two of them. I think my practical work experience helped give me the edge, as hundreds of people apply for them. I chose the one that ran as an intensive week over October half-term.

OR: What are your plans now?

GE: Thanks to my experiences, I know now I really want to work with cameras after College and I plan on working towards becoming an Assistant Director. I'm hoping to find a production apprenticeship rather than studying film at uni.

OR: What is the Reigate College Alumni Network?

KO: It enables our past students to stay in touch with us in a meaningful way that suits them. Many students feel positive about their time at College so they are often keen to help others considering a similar path. Plus we love to celebrate all sorts of alumni success.

OR: Who can join?

I then think about different ways that our alumni can help, for example with progression planning and career goals. This means I work closely with a wide range of College staff to identify who might be able help with a particular activity or topic. I see my job as finding the crossover between what our students need and where we have alumni who are enthusiastic and willing to help.

OR: How do you decide who to work with?

KO: We work most with alumni who left between one and seven years ago, as they tend to be quite relatable and a bit less intimidating to students who are just starting out. Clearly careers such as Law, Medicine and Architecture take longer to establish, so those alumni tend to be older. Because the College is large and offers such a diverse range of courses, our past students head into all sorts of directions that we love to hear about.

OR: What do alumni do?

KO: It varies. One very simple thing is doing a web profile. By showing what our alumni have achieved with their subject choices since



leaving us, our students can read about a range of different destinations and careers. Some of our alumni are also able to offer work experience and insight visits, which play a valuable role in helping our students develop their CV and employability. Other examples are careers talks, speaking at our events or being part of a panel.

OR: What do you like best about your job?

KO: Getting to talk to our past students about the direction their lives have taken since leaving us. Life is rarely lived in a straight line, so hearing how they've navigated challenges or found their passion in an unexpected place never fails to be uplifting.
